Fire Station 53 Opening



The Town officially opened Fire Station 53 in June. Thanks to everyone who joined us for the Dedication and Open House!

Station 53, located at 187 Old Lanvale Road, was built in a strategic location to serve the rapidly growing area along Highway 17. Travel times to incidents in this area that used to be 8 to 12 minutes will now improve to 4 to 8 minutes.

Leland Named StormReady Community



The National Weather Service (NWS) has named Leland a StormReady community. A meteorologist with the local NWS office presented Town Council and staff with the designation at the 2022 Hurricane Expo.

Being a StormReady community means Leland is better prepared to save people and property in the event of severe weather and has the necessary communication and safety skills to do so. The designation will help the Town strengthen safety programs by providing clear-cut guidelines on how to improve hazardous weather operations.

Town Project Updates



Fire Station 51

The Town broke ground on the newest facility for Leland Fire/Rescue, Fire Station 51, on June 16. The new station, located at the Town's Municipal Operations Center, will be fully staffed with features such as four apparatus bays, full living accommodations, a gym, office space, and a 1,200 square foot conference room.

The Town has selected Environments Unlimited Inc., who recently completed construction on Fire Station 53, to serve as the general contractor. Construction is expected to take approximately 10 months. Once finished, the new station will be home to crews currently located at the existing Station 51 on Village Road.



Ocean Gate Plaza Intersection Improvements

The goal of this project is to improve the intersection at Ocean Gate Plaza and New Pointe Boulevard. The scope of the project includes the installation of a single-lane teardrop roundabout, resurfacing Ocean Gate Drive to Highway 17,

and providing stormwater improvements.

The Town is working to bring an engineering firm on board to begin survey and design this summer.

Deadline Extended: Neighborhood Revitalization Grant Opportunity



The Town of Leland is considering an application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Neighborhood Revitalization funds from the North Carolina Rural Economic Development Division to provide rehabilitation or replacement housing assistance to lower-income homeowner households.

Owner-occupied households with lower incomes residing in substandard housing are encouraged to contact the Town if they would like to be considered for a rehabilitation or replacement housing loan (up to 8-year term, 0% interest forgiven loan) offered through the CDBG program.

To be considered for a loan, applicants must meet the criteria outlined below:

Mosquito Control

Town of Leland Public Services employees monitor mosquito activity and respond to service calls from citizens related to mosquitoes through Nov. 1.

Report a mosquito issue in your area and request adulticide spray through

Leland 311 or call (910) 371-0148. Once a report is received, a staff member will investigate the report to determine if the area meets the threshold for spray: a landing count of seven per minute. If the area meets the threshold, a truck will be routed to the area to begin spray operations. Spraying will then continue until it appears the outbreak is contained. The frequency of spraying depends on the overall number of areas that need spraying, available manpower, and the severity of the outbreak.

Request for your residence not to be sprayed.






