

WHAT TO EXPECT

Tropical Storm

Watch: Tropical storm conditions (sustained winds of 39 to 73 mph) are *possible* within the specified area within 48 hours.

Warning: Tropical storm conditions (sustained winds of 39 to 73 mph) are *expected* within your area within 36 hours.

Hurricane

Watch: Hurricane conditions (sustained winds of 74 mph or greater) are *possible* within your area. Because it may not be safe to prepare for a hurricane once winds reach tropical storm force, the National Hurricane Center (NHC) issues hurricane watches 48 hours before it anticipates tropical storm-force winds.



Hurricane Season: June 1-November 30 Categories do not account for storm surge, rainfall, and tornadoes.

Warning: Hurricane conditions (sustained winds of 74 mph or greater) are *expected* somewhere within the specified area. The NHC issues a hurricane warning 36 hours in advance of tropical stormforce winds to give you time to complete your preparations. All preparations should be complete. Evacuate immediately if so ordered.

Flooding

Watch: Conditions are *favorable* for a specific hazardous weather event to occur. This does not mean flooding will occur, but it is possible.

Warning: Flooding is imminent or already happening.



Storm Surge

Watch: There is a *possibility* of life-threatening inundation from rising water moving inland from the shoreline somewhere within the specified area, generally within 48 hours.

Warning: There is a *danger* of life-threatening inundation from rising water moving inland from the shoreline somewhere within the specified area, generally within 36 hours. If you are under a storm surge warning, check for evacuation orders from your local officials.

KNOW YOUR ZONE




North Carolina Know Your Zone is a tiered evacuation system that highlights areas most vulnerable to impacts from hurricanes, tropical storms, and other hazards. Areas in Zone A will typically be evacuated first, followed by areas in Zone B, etc.



If you are asked to evacuate, promptly heed instructions from local officals. Law enforcement officers, the NCDOT Safety Patrol, and other personnel are typically positioned along the major evacuation routes to help drivers.

SHELTERING AT HOME

If you choose to remain at home, make sure you have enough supplies to be self-sufficient for several days. If the eye of the storm passes over your area, be aware that severe conditions will quickly return.

- Stay tuned to local radio weather stations. NOAA Weather Radio set to frequency 162.550 MHz (KHB-31) serves Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, New Hanover, Pender and southern Sampson counties, and the North Carolina coastal waters between Surf City and Little River Inlet.
- Always place generators and grills outdoors and not within your home.
- Plug appliances directly into the generator.



PUBLIC SHELTERS

Shelters will be managed by Brunswick County if Leland is experiencing an emergency event. Brunswick County has two primary shelter locations. In the event of a hurricane, Brunswick County will direct most individuals who need a shelter option to these locations.

Shelter Rules/Accommodations

Meals

- Ready-to-eat meal kits and bottled water are available to shelter guests for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.
- Individuals are encouraged to bring their own pre-cooked, non-perishable foods, like canned meats, granola bars, peanut butter, instant soup, cereals, dried fruit, powdered milk, etc.

Beds

- Each individual will be assigned to a dedicated sleeping pad.
- Individuals are encouraged to bring their own preferred blanket, sleeping bag, and/or pillow.
- A select number of cots are available for individuals with mobility issues.

Animals at the pet safe shelters are required to have:

- Proper identification, including collar and rabies tag.
- Proper identification on all belongings.
- A carrier, leash, medication, and trash bags.
- A supply of food, water, and food bowls.
- Specific care instructions.

Prohibited Items

- Alcohol
- Illegal drugs or substances
- Mattresses
- Weapons

Secondary/Alternative Locations

Brunswick County's hurricane preparation plans include secondary or alternative shelters in the event of overflow at its primary shelters or to accommodate additional sheltering needs. Additional shelter locations can be found by scanning the QR code.



AFTER THE STORM



Re-entry

If evacuated, only return when you have been informed it is safe to do so. Ensure you have your ID with the correct address as this may be required for re-entry following a storm.



- Do not move or drive around barricades.
- Never walk or drive through floodwaters.
- Take pictures of any damage.
- Check news outlets for a boiled water statement.
- Always place generators outdoors and not within your home.
- Avoid downed powerlines. Report to your power company.
- Contact animal control if wildlife enters your home.
- Do not use candles or open flames in case of a gas leak.

Making Repairs

Work that requires a building permit:

- Work over \$40,000
- Work on structural load-bearing members
- Mechanical, electrical, and plumbing work

A floodplain development permit will be required for repairs or improvements in a special flood hazard area.
