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Public Safety (Police, Fire/Rescue, Emergency Management)	22
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Administration News

Beginning August 16, Town Hall was again closed to non-scheduled, walk-in visitors due to the increase in COVID cases. All other Town facilities remain open, and employees continue to work as normal while maintaining appropriate precautions. Staff will continue to evaluate existing conditions and make operational adjustments as necessary.

Town Clerk's Office

Ms. Reinhardt attended the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks Annual Summer Academy from August 19 to August 21.

Work Priorities

- Annual Board/Committee Rules of Procedure and Ethics Training with the Town Attorney will be held on On October 4 at 6:00 PM at Town Hall. Board and committee members have been asked to save the date. Additional event announcements will be emailed as the date draws near.
- The Old Fayetteville Road Multi-Use Path Ribbon Cutting Ceremony is tentatively scheduled for October 18. Staff is working on event logistics and confirming the event date.
- Adopted Resolution R21-094 Requesting the WMPO and NCDOT to Work Together to Add the Cape Fear Memorial Bridge to the STIP
 was emailed to the WMPO and NCDOT on August 31.

Council Directive Updates

- American Rescue Plan Act of 2021: Staff continues to attend webinars and review published guidance on how funds can be spent. Final guidance for spending the funds is expected to be released by the US Treasury in September. Once this final release is available, staff will meet to further discuss allowable projects and present to Council at a future meeting.
- USPS Changing Postal ZIP Code Boundaries: Staff sent a letter on September 2 to both the Mallory Creek and Westport HOA Boards
 notifying them of the optional postal address change from Winnabow to Leland, while still utilizing the 28479 ZIP code for residents of
 those neighborhoods.
- Coastal Carolina Curling Club Letter of Support was prepared and sent to the organization on August 30, 2021.

Project Updates

Old Fayetteville Road Multi-Use Path (STP-DA U-5534D)

- Purpose: To develop a roadside multi-use path along the north side of Old Fayetteville Road from Town Hall Drive to North Brunswick High School.
- Status: Construction is underway. Final completion is scheduled for October 4, 2021.
- Next Steps: The contractor has completed paving on the multi-use path and roadway. The next steps are for the contractor to install ADA mats on the curb ramps, install new street signs and pavement markers, and clean up the project site. A ribbon cutting ceremony is tentatively scheduled for October 18, 2021.
- Concerns: Install a second catch basin to catch the water that is ponding at the intersection of Town Hall Drive and Old
 Fayetteville Road. C.M. Mitchell's estimate was extremely high so NCDOT is working with FHWA to see how to use another
 contractor to do the work. The work is on hold until NCDOT provides guidance.

2014 STP-DA Projects U5534 (I, J, K)

- Purpose: To construct a sidewalk along Old Fayetteville Road from Ricefield Branch to Leland Middle School, a multi-use path
 extension along Village Road from the Brunswick County Senior Center to Sturgeon Creek, and a sidewalk loop from Town Hall
 Drive down Village and Old Fayetteville Roads.
- Status: Construction is underway. Final Completion is scheduled for September 21, 2021.
- Next Steps: The contractor has paved the multi-use path on Village Road and plans to finish up work along Old Fayetteville Road near Leland Middle School and will be moving to Town Hall Drive to complete those improvements.
- Concerns: Contractor completing the project by September 21, 2021.

Kay Todd Road Utilities

- Purpose: To provide water and sewer in Brunswick Forest to help serve the developing areas within Brunswick Forest and along Kay Todd Road.
- Status: Construction is underway. Final completion is anticipated for September 30, 2021.
- Next Steps: The contractor has completed installation of water and sewer along Kay Todd Road. The next steps are to install sanitary sewer from the lift station to Hewett Burton Road and complete a partial sewer certification for the segment up to House of Pickleball, allowing them to connect to the sewer main.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Brunswick Village Boulevard Extension Paving & Kay Todd Road Multi-Use Path

- Purpose: To extend Brunswick Village Boulevard across Kay Todd Road, past Regional Pump Station #33 to Hewett-Burton Road.
- Status: Project is in design and permitting. Geotechnical testing of Brunswick Village Boulevard is complete, and staff is waiting on results and recommendation on asphalt thickness from the engineer.
- Next Steps: Project is on hold pending the approval of the Brunswick Village Boulevard crossing of the MOTSU railroad for the developer.
- Concerns: Developer obtaining approval of the Brunswick Village Boulevard railroad crossing.

Brunswick Forest Parkway & Low Country Boulevard Intersection Improvements

- Purpose: To improve the intersection at Brunswick Forest Parkway and Low Country Boulevard, as well as restripe existing centerline stripes, crosswalks, and stop bars along Brunswick Forest Parkway and Low Country Boulevard.
- Status: Construction is slated to begin September 7 and, pending weather, will be completed by September 17, 2021.
- Next Steps: Construction activities to begin.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Olde Waterford Way Extension

- Purpose: To extend Olde Waterford Way from Palm Ridge Drive to Olde Regent Way. This road extension will alleviate traffic congestion along existing Olde Waterford Way and better serve the developing areas within Waterford.
- Status: Project is in design and permitting. All memorandum-of-understandings (MOUs) for right-of-way and easement acquisition required for the roadway extension have been signed and approved by Council. A public meeting was held on August 31 to discuss the project.
- Next Steps: Continue with design and permitting. Staff anticipates bidding construction of the project in October.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Leland Unpaved Road Improvements

- Purpose: To improve the unpaved roads of Breman Lane, John Sneed Lane, and Graham Drive.
- Status: Survey access letters have been sent to property owners and Atlantic Coast Survey is slated to begin survey work on September 13, 2021.
- Next Steps: Complete survey of roads by October 30, 2021 and begin developing concept plans for staff to review.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Wayne Street Extension

- Purpose: To extend Wayne Street to Royal Street NE which will provide an additional connector route of Village Road and Old Fayetteville Road.
- Status: Issued a task order to obtain survey data of the project area.
- Next Steps: Receive and analyze the survey data of the project area.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Town of Leland Streets Paving 2021-2022

- Purpose: To resurface eight (8) streets within the Town limits to include Olde Waterford Way, Woodwind Drive, Palm Ridge Drive, Old Village Circle, a portion of Pine Harvest Drive, Bentgreen Drive, West Gate Drive, and the commercial section of Grandiflora Drive.
- Status: Staff is working with on-call engineers to finalize a task order for survey and design.
- Next Steps: Issue a task order for design, survey, and permitting services.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Leland Fire Station 51 – 1987 Andrew Jackson Hwy NE

- Purpose: Construction of a new fire station at the Municipal Operations Center at 1987 Andrew Jackson Highway NE.
- Status: Preliminary site design/building design has been approved and Environments Unlimited (EU) is working on a preliminary cost estimate for the project.
- Next Steps: Review preliminary cost estimate when received and give go ahead to EU to begin mechanical, electrical, and plumbing plans and work towards a final cost estimate.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Leland Fire Station 53 – 187 Old Lanvale Road

- Purpose: Construction and upfit of existing satellite fire station.
- Status: The slab has been poured, framing installed on the addition, and firewall work has begun.
- Next Steps: Continue work on framing, both on slab and interior portion of building. Continue with site work and stormwater improvements. Continue working on selections and budget for site furnishings, gear racks, workout equipment, etc.
- Concerns: Meeting project schedule with design delays and market conditions of supply acquisition.

1987 Andrew Jackson Highway (Municipal Operations Center)

- Purpose: Up-fit property and facilities to support Town operations.
- Status: Currently working on a number of projects related to the move-in of the second warehouse including electric, intake vent installation, and vehicle lane striping. Pallet racks, cabinets, and workbenches are on order and awaiting an installation date.
- Next Steps: Obtain final quote for warehouse breakroom renovation and pallet rack systems. Schedule renovation and proceed with move-in. Pallet rack, workbench, and cabinet installation.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Emergency Watershed Protection - Stream Clearing

- Purpose: Snag and drag and stabilization of four streams in Leland that have debris buildup due to Hurricane Florence.
- Status: Cleanup and debris removal has been completed on all four sections of stream. Awaiting final design for stabilization.
- Next Steps: Waiting on design for streambank stabilization of Jackeys Creek. Currently reviewing work that has already been completed and will be sending documentation to USDA for reimbursement.
- Concerns: None at this time.

Sturgeon Creek Park

- Purpose: Phased park development of property located off of South Navassa Road at Sturgeon Creek.
- Status: The house on the site has been removed.
- Next Steps: WithersRavenel to complete a Brownfield study of the property.
- Concerns: Funding for park project once study has been completed.

Founders Park Improvements

- Purpose: Phase 1A and 1B park improvements that would include walking paths, play areas, picnic shelters, and an amphitheater.
- Status: Cost opinion from Sawyer on building designs were higher than anticipated. Currently reassessing design needs and expectations before proceeding with design work.
- Next Steps: Schedule a meeting with Duke Energy to discuss lighting and power needs for the park so this can be incorporated
 into the final design. Review architectural design work with Sawyer and publish RFQ to advertise for design-build of playground
 and splash pad.
- Concerns: Timing of animal control move to the MOC will be important as the project moves to the construction phase.

Animal Control/Police Impound Facility at the Municipal Operations Center

- Purpose: Repurpose and renovate the existing truck wash building for use as a new animal control and Police storage facility.
- Status: Coastal Land Design (CLD) has provided a preliminary site plan for the project. A task order has been signed for CLD to continue with site design up to 100% bid package. A task order has been signed with Goodrich Architecture to begin building design.
- Next Steps: Review design plans from Goodrich once submitted and continue working with CLD on the final site plan.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.


Loblolly Park on Kay Todd Road

- Purpose: Develop donated land off of Kay Todd Road into a new Town park with features that include a new 18-hole disc golf course and primitive walking trails.
- Status: Council formally adopted the name Loblolly Park at their August regular meeting. Met with McGill to review project scope and awaiting a proposal for development of an overall park master plan.
- Next Steps: Finalize proposal and issue task order for park master plan.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.

Town Hall Renovation

- Purpose: Renovate Town Hall to gain more useable workspace including offices, conference rooms, and a redesign of employee breakrooms.
- Status: Quote for design changes has been approved and Sawyer is working toward providing updated design plans.
- Next Steps: Acoustic ceiling tiles were installed in two offices and staff is currently evaluating their effectiveness. 60% design plans are expected to be completed and ready for review the first week of September.
- Concerns: No concerns at this time.



Chief Shirley, Captain Humphries, and Captain Spence attended FEMA Field Force Command for Executives in New Hanover County. This 8-hour course is designed to prepare the management-level responder to serve as a member of an incident management team during a civil action or disorder. Topics of instruction included incident management, incorporating planning considerations, and other responsibilities, including the ability to develop a local Incident Action Plan (IAP) of such events.

This 40-hour course teaches the experienced officer how to effectively supervise personnel and give them the basic concepts of management and employee relations within a law enforcement agency.

The department welcomed a new hire, Andrew Taylor. Officer Taylor was sworn in on August 30, 2021 and has begun field training.


Senior Officer Glen Payne attended Warrantless Searches at Cape Fear Community College. This 16-hour course discusses law enforcement's authority to search and seize without a warrant, while providing in-depth discussions of the Fourth Amendment and the federal and North Carolina case law defining the parameters of the major exceptions to the warrant requirement.




The Drug Enforcement Administration Task Force assigned agent has acquired two informants and has opened a local case which the DEA has adopted.








Good progress is being made on the construction of Fire Station 53 on Old Lanvale Road. Design plans are being finalized on the new Fire Station 51, which will be located at the Municipal Operations Center on Hwy 74/76. The department is sending personnel to conduct a pre-construction design visit with the manufacturer who will be building the new ladder truck. During this visit, those personnel will conduct a final inspection of the second new engine (Engine 51) that is in final construction stages and is expected to arrive in October.



Calls for service continue to increase. In August of last fiscal year, the department responded to 206 calls compared to 265 calls this fiscal year. This amounted to a 23% increase.



The annual Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Resources Open House took place at the Leland Cultural Arts Center (LCAC) on August 28, 2021. The fall schedule begins in September with more than 60 programs running in the first session.

Halloween events include Trunk-or-Treat for families and the LCAC Boo Ball costume party for adults. In November, a brand-new community event, Leland Homecoming at Founders Park, will feature live music, food trucks, and games.

Joe Vetter joined the department in August as Building Inspector III. Mr. Vetter has extensive history as a building inspector with a concentration in plumbing code enforcement.

Eric Heunemann completed the Fire Prevention Level III course and is now preparing to take the exam to obtain his Standard Fire Level III Certification, which is the highest level attainable in this trade area.

Daniel Knoch, Leland's Chief Building Official, has worked with Cape Fear Community College to get credentialed as an instructor for continuing education classes for building inspectors. Most continuing education offerings for inspectors are in other parts of the state, so Mr. Knoch's classes will benefit inspectors in the area by offering more local classes. Mr. Knoch will have one class in September and one class in October.

Brandon Eaton obtained two certifications through the International Code Council (ICC) including ICC Certified Property Maintenance and Housing Inspector and an ICC Certified Zoning Inspector. With these two certifications combined, Mr. Eaton is now able to apply for the AACE CCEO (Certified Code Enforcement Officer) exam.



Long Range Planning Update



The Leland 2045 plan continues to come together with the 60% draft completed in August. Staff and Design Workshop are working towards several milestones in September:

September 13: Project Update to Town Council – Town staff will present a brief update on the project progress and next steps to Town Council at the Council Agenda Meeting.

September 20: Leland 2045 Focus Group Meeting – Staff will host the Focus Group to present for comment and feedback the project themes and goals, future land use framework, community types, and geographic focal areas.

September 28: Presentation to Planning Board – Design Workshop staff will present for comment and feedback the project themes and goals, future land use framework, community types, and geographic focal areas. At this time, the 90% plan draft is expected to be completed and will be distributed to the Planning Board, Town Council, Focus Group, internal and external stakeholders, and the public. Comments on the 90% draft will be accepted through October 15.

September 29: Community Meeting – A community meeting will be held from 6 to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, September 29 in the Cape Fear Room at Leland Town Hall. The meeting will be "drop in" style and attendees are welcome to come review displays that overview the plan's themes, goals, vision statement, future land use framework, community types, and geographic focal areas.

Transportation Planning Update

WMPO/NCDOT Traffic Impact Analysis Review Committee – Staff attended weekly meetings to provide input on scoping and the results of traffic impact analyses for pending projects in the Westgate Drive/Ocean Gate Plaza area of Leland, a project on Old Town Creek Road, and Mallory Creek. Staff is also coordinating with Davenport Engineering and the WMPO and NCDOT on a roundabout proposal on Ocean Gate Plaza and New Pointe Boulevard and a potential new northbound left turn from US Highway 17 onto Olde Regent Way.


In August, staff applied for funding from the Coronavirus Response and Recovery Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA), administered by the WMPO. The application is for \$687,857.88 for the construction of an at-grade pedestrian crossing at the intersection of US Highway 17 and Ploof Road/Olde Waterford Way, in addition to approximately 300' of sidewalk adjacent to Olde Waterford Way to connect the proposed pedestrian crossing to the existing sidewalk network in the Waterford commercial and residential areas. A decision on the funding application is anticipated in October.

GIS Update


Planning and Public Services staff are coordinating to create an online interactive map to help area residents learn who maintains streets in their neighborhoods. Street maintenance can be the responsibility of Leland, NCDOT, or a private homeowners association or other private entity, depending on the street type and whether it has been accepted for public maintenance. Public Services Department Updates

GIS Intern Russell Isobe completed his internship on August 11. He will be returning to UNCW to complete his undergraduate program and has expressed interest in returning as a GIS Intern in 2022.

Streets Updates

Work Priorities

- Staff is manning the vegetative debris site during operating hours, assisting the public, and collecting vouchers. In August, four citizens purchased 25 vouchers, and eight citizens delivered 12 loads of debris for the month.
- Karl Keefe and Tim Hall, Street Maintenance Technicians, passed the NC Pesticide Applicator Public Health Pest Control License exam in August and will be receiving their licenses in September. This allows both employees to perform vector control duties throughout the Town.
- Seven (7) staff members are currently attending the OSHA 30 Construction certification course. This course will be completed by the middle of September.
- Staff completed repairing sinkholes located within the roadway. These sinkholes occur when there is a breach in the drainage structure. This breach causes a void to form either under the asphalt or in the grass, eventually causing a small hole to form in the vicinity of the structure. Sinkhole repair includes repairing the drainage structure as well as the roadway. Some of the areas completed were within Mallory Creek, Brunswick Forest, and areas north of Village Road.
- Staff is concentrating on cleaning out ditches in several neighborhoods. The Ricefield Branch neighborhood has been completed
 and crews are now working in the Fairview Road neighborhood.
- Staff is in the process of gathering quotes for several sidewalk extension projects, including Westport Drive, Greensview Drive, Fennel Creek Drive, and N. Palm Drive. These are areas in which existing sidewalk segments within the right-of-way have not been connected. This work will also include updating an intersection in Magnolia Greens that is not ADA compliant.
- Staff is in the process of gathering quotes for three storm drain repairs that are too large in scope to be completed in-house. The project areas are in Mallory Creek, Magnolia Greens, and Brunswick Forest.

Initiatives

• Staff is creating a streets design manual, which will include standard specifications and details to be used in the design and construction of new and rehabbed Town streets. Staff is reviewing the standard details and specifications now, with the goal to finalize the details and specifications this fall.

- Staff is reviewing Town-maintained gravel roads for possible paving. Staff has budgeted for the survey and design work associated with paving these roads in the FY 21/22 budget and awarded the design phase for this project in July with survey work to start in September. Roads under review include Graham Drive, Breman Lane, and John Sneed Lane.
- Staff is working on the annual NPDES Phase 2 Stormwater Permit report. The draft report is under review and must be submitted to NCDEQ in October.
- Staff is in the process of updating the Vector Control and Pesticide Application Standard Operating Procedure as well as the Pesticide Discharge Management Plan, both of which are anticipated to be updated by the end of October.
- NC Resilient Communities Grant work continued in August, with the public meeting being held on August 25.

Project Notes


- Construction will be starting on the Brunswick Forest Parkway and Low County Boulevard intersection improvement project in September, which includes restriping Brunswick Forest Parkway and Low County Boulevard. C. M. Mitchell Construction Company, Inc. is the contractor for this project, which is scheduled to be completed in September.
- Staff continues to work on the Olde Waterford Way roadway extension project, conducting a public meeting for this project on August 31 which was attended by 45 citizens. Design is ongoing with 90% plans anticipated in September. Staff is planning to bid the construction phase of this project in October.
- Staff is working on the FY 21/22 street resurfacing project, obtaining proposals from qualified on-call engineering firms to complete the design phase of this project. Streets to be resurfaced include portions of Olde Waterford Way, Palm Ridge Drive, Pine Harvest Drive, and Grandiflora Drive.


Significant Purchases

• Staff finalized the purchase orders for the skid steer and plate tamper in August. Delivery of the skid steer is anticipated in October or November.

Work Order Summary

- Streets received 136 work orders in August, with most of them being vector control related (76).
- Streets completed 49 work orders in August, with an approximate expense of \$27,500 in labor, equipment, and materials to complete these work orders.





Staff has continued working with **Twin Rivers Capital**, located in Charleston, South Carolina, on the development of a 4.68-acre site at the corner of Highway 17 and Ocean Gate Way to be named **Leland Corners**. The parcel is presently owned by Lidl US Operations, LLC., the parent company of Lidl grocery store, and was voluntarily annexed into the Town in November 2020. Twin Rivers plans to purchase the property and put four retail businesses on the site, including **Cookout** and **Take 5 Oil Change**.

Mr. Vidmar is working with the owner of the 225-acre parcel in the **Leland Innovation Park** that was annexed into the Town in July 2020 to close deals with three major businesses that have shown interest in building new facilities in the Park.

Mr. Vidmar is beginning to see increased interest in undeveloped properties along the Village Road corridor. Most recently, Mr. Vidmar and Planning staff have had conversations with developers studying the viability of a potential project on a 7-acre vacant property between South Navassa Road and Oakland Avenue and a potential project on a 25-acre vacant property on Inheritance Lane.

New Businesses

• Cygnus Technologies announced that it will move into a new 45,000 square-foot facility under development by Wilmington-based CIGG LLC at Waterford Commercial Village. The two-story building will be located next to the Tru by Hilton hotel on the extension of Olde Waterford Way and will house 50 existing Cygnus employees with room for up to 150 employees that could be hired over the next five years. Cygnus presently operates out of a 20,000 square-foot facility in Southport. The company manufactures, assembles, and distributes kits that allow pharmaceutical and biotech companies to detect and identify host cell impurities in biotherapeutics, a major step in regulatory approval and quality control.

New Construction/Development

- SAMM Properties has announced plans to construct two 36,000 square-foot Class-A office and retail buildings in the Waterford Commercial Village in front of the **Tru by Hilton** hotel. Currently in the design and planning phase, SAMM Properties anticipates breaking ground on this project in the first quarter of 2022. SAMM Properties has developed many office and retail projects in Wilmington including the series of buildings that makes up **The Offices at Mayfaire**, **The Offices at Airlie** on Military Cutoff Road, and most recently, **Bradley Creek Station** on Oleander Drive.
- The Town has received a development site plan application from **Carolina Shores Car Wash**. **Carolina Shores** plans to build its second car wash location in Leland on Gateway Boulevard in the **Leland Town Center** behind **Chick-fil-A**.

Economic and Community Development

- The Town has received a development site plan application from **Deana Cook, D.D.S**. Dr. Cook plans to build a 7,105 square-foot dental office on Magnolia Village Way in Magnolia Greens. Dr. Cook also runs **Cook Periodontics and Dental Implants** in Wilmington.
- Sitework is underway on a 3-acre site next to Harris Teeter in the Waterford Commercial Village, where Crown Hotel and Travel Management is building a **Tru by Hilton** hotel. The hotel will have 93 rooms and offer an indoor pool, continental breakfast, and other amenities.
- Construction is progressing on the new Custom Home Furniture Galleries Outlet store, a two-story, 56,000 square foot furniture showroom in the Waterford Commercial Village across from Leland Station.
- The owners of **7Twenty6 Brewing Company** are expecting construction to begin in October on a new brewery that will be located on Old Fayetteville Road across from Town Hall. The project was delayed due to the pandemic.

Economic Development Committee Meeting Summary

The Economic Development Committee met on August 26, 2021. The Committee held a workshop to begin updating the 2019 Economic Development Strategic Plan.
