

STAFF REPORTS

June 2023 Regular Meeting

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Staff received 183 requests for service in May and completed 143 (78%).

Corey Bryant was promoted to Facilities Maintenance Technician II.

Current staff vacancies include Engineering Technician, Senior Construction Inspector, Construction Inspector, and Streets Maintenance Technician.

Streets Updates

Work Priorities

- Staff began an extensive sidewalk replacement project in Brunswick Forest. This work includes removing trees, stumps and replacing various lengths of sidewalk at multiple locations. This project is expected to be completed in early June.
- Staff replaced signs that had been vandalized in Windsor Park.
- Staff completed replacing damaged sidewalks on Old Fayetteville Road at Founders Park.
- Staff spent several days cleaning up after the flash flooding event that took place on May 19.
- Staff repaired potholes throughout Town using hot mix asphalt and cold patch asphalt as required.
- Staff will begin replacing sidewalks damaged by trees in several locations in Magnolia Greens. This work includes removing trees, stumps, and replacing various lengths of damaged sidewalk at multiple locations.
- Staff will begin mowing rights-of-way on Village Road and Old Fayetteville Road.
- Staff will continue performing mosquito counts in affected areas.

Initiatives

- Brunswick Engineering Company has completed the pavement condition and pavement markings condition assessment for Town-owned streets. This work is completed on a three-year cycle and is used to identify and prioritize street capital improvement projects. The finalized assessment and supporting inspection reports are complete. Staff will be reviewing and working on priority lists for the next round of street resurfacing and pavement marking projects.
- The Town has hired Oglesby Construction to install thermoplastic striping on New Pointe Boulevard, Pine Harvest Drive in Magnolia Greens, Cape Fear National Drive, Shelmore Way, and Rice Gate Way. The contractor will be installing new striping to

the areas to include centerline double yellow, crosswalks, stop bars, and the center turn lane and arrows in the commercial section of New Pointe Boulevard. The work is expected to start June 5and take two weeks to complete.

Work Order Summary

- Streets processed 24 work orders in May, with the majority being pothole/sinkhole (9) and storm cleanup related (6).
- Streets completed 17 work orders in May, with an approximate expense of \$21,200 in labor, equipment, and materials to complete these work orders. The bulk of this expense was in equipment costs (\$11,000).

Grounds Updates

Work Priorities and Initiatives

- Staff is working with NCDOT on the restoration and stabilization of the slopes along Village Road under the US 74/17 overpass near the diverging diamond. NCDOT will be stabilizing this area soon, and the Town will take over maintenance of the stabilization.
- Staff began maintaining the new right-of-way section of Olde Waterford Way.
- Staff will continue post-emergence on Town properties.
- Staff is continuing to work on the Northgate stormwater pond soil prep and seeding to stabilize the area.
- Staff will be installing playground mulch at Westgate Nature Park.
- Staff will be replacing a portion of the playground mulch at Founders Park.
- Staff will be maintaining the rear portion of property at the MOC.
- Staff will be performing vegetative maintenance at the future Sweetbay Park site.




- Staff completed landscape planting on the Village Road medians and islands.

- Staff will be working with a vendor to repair the roof at the LCAC.




- Staff is working with Fleet Representatives to complete safety recalls on seven vehicles.



Sergeant Munger attended Master Taser Instructor School May 1-5 in Charlotte. Completion of this school ensures certification as a Taser Instructor, allowing for the opportunity to administer tasers and teach other law enforcement officers how to properly use their taser.

Officers Wooley, Brown, Piniewski, and Roberts attended Standardized Field Sobriety Testing recertification on May 1 and 3 at the Oak Island Police Department. This training recertifies officers to continue to use their knowledge and skills to detect impaired drivers.

Senior Officer Berry attended the Domestic Violence Institute May 8-12 in Edneyville. This course is intended to provide the knowledge and skills necessary to effectively respond to and investigate domestic violence incidents and provide trauma-informed responses to victims.

Officer Roberts attended the General Criminal Investigations course May 8-12 at the North Carolina Justice Academy. This foundational course teaches officers broad yet fundamental investigative procedures necessary to conduct a thorough criminal investigation starting with the initial response and ending with a successful prosecution.

Sergeant Winder attended the third and final week of the Police Leadership Institute May 8-12 at the North Carolina Justice Academy. This training spans over a three-month period and is designed to equip criminal justice leaders with the tools to steer their agencies and communities toward the future.

Officer Mercado attended the Warrantless Searches course May 9-10 at the North Carolina Justice Academy. This course reviewed basic laws of warrantless searches to enable officers to perform their duties lawfully and effectively.

Senior Officer Martin attended a two-week crash reconstruction course May 15-26 at the North Carolina Justice Academy. This course enables participants to reconstruct traffic crashes using previously gained knowledge in combination with materials learned in the course.

Officer Odom attended Standardized Field Sobriety Testing training May 15-17 in Jacksonville. This course is intended to give officers knowledge and skills to detect impaired drivers.

Sergeant McLamb and Officers Roberts, Piniewski, and Whitmire attended Standardized Field Sobriety Testing refresher training on May 16 at the Leland Police Department. This training recertifies officers to continue to use their knowledge and skills to detect impaired drivers.

Officer Brown and Detective Gaston attended the Community Oriented Policing training May 23-25 at the North Carolina Justice Academy. This course is for personnel actively engaged in community policing initiatives within their agency.



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


Officer Holland attended a virtual Human Trafficking course on May 24. This course is designed to teach officers how to handle human trafficking calls and certain things to watch out for.



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
In addition to answering calls, staff accomplished numerous tasks in May:

- Participated in the Belville Founders Day Celebration and interacted with approximately 40 citizens




Staff made 15 water rescues during the flood event on May 19.

Chief Grimes worked on preparing staff for the 2023 hurricane season. Multiple training sessions were held including Intermediate Incident Command Systems (ICS-300), Advanced Incident Command Systems (ICS-400), Finance and Logistics section review, and training on the new Incident Action Plan software. The Town now boasts more than 50 NIMS-trained staff members. This level is exceptionally rare in municipalities of this size and reinforces the following Council vision statement: *Be the Safest southeastern NC town through preventative and responsive emergency services and citizen engagement* and to *Be a town well prepared for, responsive to, and able to recover from natural and humanmade hazards.*

The Staff Support Team worked on updating all department emergency playbooks. Chief Grimes attended the Brunswick County Public Health Integrated Preparedness Planning Workshop and training in Evacuation Planning Strategies and Solutions in New Hanover County. Work continues to review and amend the Emergency Operations Plan and for the 2023 Hurricane Expo. Chief Grimes and Public Services staff met to discuss the activation of the Disaster Debris Management Plan. Chief Grimes worked with the Planning Department on reviewing a text amendment.

Andrew Neylon, Ernie Hernandez, Lawrence Wills, and Marissa Ernst completed CPR training offered through the Town of Leland.

Ben Watts and Ms. Ernst attended "All about Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)", a webinar hosted by Land of Sky Council of Governments. The webinar focused on how ADUs can be used to provide the missing middle of housing. Key takeaways were to increase allowable size of ADUs, ensure accessibility for differently abled persons, and how wealth generation can be achieved with ADUs through treating them like condos.

Ben Andrea and Mr. Neylon attended the Association of State Floodplain Managers annual conference. This conference provided an overview of best practices and industry developments from experts in floodplain management.

Mr. Neylon attended the National Flood Insurance Program's Summer Virtual Workshop hosted by NC Emergency Management. The workshop reviewed the regulations of the National Flood Insurance Program, NCEM Flood Risk Information System, and substantial damage and substantial improvement assessments.

Ms. Ernst and Mr. Neylon attended "It's not personal: Self-Care tips to avoid burnout, conflict, and contentious community meetings", a webinar hosted by the American Planning Association. This webinar provided tips on how planners can handle emotional situations and face public criticism which can lead to stress and burnout.

Ashli Barefoot attended ICS-300 Intermediate for ICS Expanding Events, ICS-400 Advanced ICS – Complex Incidents, and Incident Action Plan Software Training hosted by the Town. The ICS courses are FEMA-certified courses and all three courses are critical to individuals who play a significant role in the Town's Incident Management Team.





Creative Economic Development Consulting, LLC and staff are continuing to make progress on creating an Economic Development Incentive Policy. On May 24, Creative held a meeting with Mr. Sutton and Mr. Vidmar to review the first draft of the Incentive Policy. Council will hear a presentation of the draft in July and consider adoption of the policy in August.

On May 25, Mr. Vidmar gave an economic development presentation to the Leland Rotary Club pertaining to several commercial and residential projects, Town-led park projects, NCDOT roadway projects, and a potential mixed-use development on an approximately 1,400-acre property next to Brunswick Forest.

New Businesses

- Leland Brewing Company is planning to open this month brewing their own beers. This will be Leland's second brewery and first in the Gateway District.
- Eggs Up Grill, founded in 1997 in the coastal community of Pawleys Island, S.C., operates in three locations in the Cape Fear area, two of which are in southern Brunswick County. A new location is planned for a multi-tenant retail building to be built behind Aldi in Leland Town Center later this year or early 2024.

New Construction/Development



- The Technical Review Committee is also reviewing plans for a 3,064 square-foot retail building being developed in the **Gateway District** along S. Navassa Road.

Economic Development Committee Meeting Summary

The Economic Development Committee met on May 11, 2023, and heard an update from Mr. Vidmar on the Economic Development Strategic Plan. 





